A MESSAGE FROM **NSHD INTERIM HEALTH OFFICER**

Dear North Shore Residents, Partners, and Friends,

The past year has been one of change. Our priorities adjusted as we moved through a second year of pandemic response, including multiple modifications in COVID-19 mitigation and response activities. We continued to adapt as new information became known about this virus, which involved constant need for public education and adjustments to our guidance. In addition, we have undergone many changes in our own team here at the North Shore Health Department, as transformations to the public health workforce have happened across the state.

Our core mission continues to be to establish partnerships in the community and work with these partners to assure, promote and protect the health and safety of the people in the North Shore.

While 2021 was spent in a large part responding to COVID-19 cases, providing guidance and contact tracing education, community education, business follow-up, and assistance to vulnerable populations in Long Term Care Facilities, childcare centers, schools and other settings, we have continued to provide our core services:

- Communicable Disease Prevention and Control
- Chronic Disease Prevention and Management
- Environmental Health, including licensing and inspection for restaurants, retail food establishments, hotels and public pools
- Injury Prevention Across the Lifespan
- Public Health Emergency Preparedness

The COVID-19 specific work:

- Established a robust COVID-19 vaccination program, expanding to school-based clinics and booster clinics as recommendations were made for expanded age groups and additional vaccinations.
- Ongoing education to community members and partners regarding changes in isolation, quarantine, mitigation and vaccination guidance.
- Continued support and education surrounding testing availability in our area.
- Provided isolation guidance to over 10,000 North Shore residents and quarantine guidance to contacts of those testing positive.
- Maintained strong partnerships with our schools to provide guidance and support as they move through the changes brought about by COVID-19.

• Established plans for the next steps in community assessment and recovery from the effects of COVID-19, improved public health workforce development and stronger partnerships within the community. These plans will continue to be developed and adjusted as we respond to changes in guidance and expectations from the CDC and Wisconsin Department of Health Services surrounding COVID-19 response.

It has been an honor to serve in the role of Interim Health Officer and I want to thank each of our very talented core employees, COVID-19 staff, intern staff and volunteers that have each played a critical part in fulfilling the mission of the North Shore Health Department.

NORTH SHORE HEALTH DEPARTMENT 2021 ANNUAL REPORT

MISSION

The mission of the North Shore Health Department (NSHD) is to work in partnership with the communities we serve to assure, promote and protect the health and safety of the people in the North Shore. The NSHD provides public health services for the seven Wisconsin communities of Bayside, Brown Deer, Fox Point, Glendale, River Hills, Shorewood and Whitefish Bay, with a total population of approximately 67,695.

The North Shore Health Department has two offices located in Brown Deer and Shorewood. Residents can utilize services at either location. The NSHD is advised by a Board of Health comprised of representatives from each of the seven communities in the North Shore, along with a medical advisor. The Village of Brown Deer serves as the fiscal and administrative agent for the NSHD.

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Public Health Essential Services for Health Departments

- 1. Monitor health status to identify and solve community health problems.
- 2. Diagnose and investigate health problems and health hazards in the community.
- 3. Inform, educate and empower people about health issues.
- 4. Mobilize community partnerships to identify and solve health problems.
- 5. Develop policies and plans that support individual and community health efforts.
- 6. Enforce laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety.
- 7. Link people to needed personal health services and assure the provision of health care when otherwise unavailable.
- 8. Assure a competent public and personal healthcare workforce.
- 9. Evaluate effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of personal and population-based health services.
- 10. Research for new insights and innovate solutions to health problems.

COMMUNITY HEALTH ASSESSMENT AND IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The Department is guided by our Strategic Plan and our Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), available in the Reports section of our website. The CHIP outlines the health priorities of North Shore residents based on the results of the 2019 Community Health Assessment (CHA). The priority areas include mental and emotional health, substance free living, injury prevention, physical activity and nutrition. The COVID-19 pandemic also became a priority in 2020 and continued to be a focus of our department in 2021.

In 2022, the North Shore Health Department will begin another Community Health Assessment, which will inform the creation of the next Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP).

COMMUNICABLE DISEASE PREVENTION AND CONTROL

A communicable (or infectious) disease is an illness transmitted through direct contact with an infected individual or animal – or indirectly through contact with a vector, such as a mosquito, tick, or plant, with blood or bodily fluids, or by breathing in an airborne virus or bacteria. As part of Wisconsin State Statute, 252 – Communicable Diseases, the NSHD is required to follow up and respond to all Category I and II diseases and conditions considered to have significant public health impact.

Wisconsin local health departments investigate all suspect, probable and confirmed cases of reportable communicable diseases to prevent and control the spread of disease in the community. In 2021, the NSHD responded to 579 suspect and probable disease incidents and conditions, not including COVID-19. A total of 501 of these were confirmed disease cases (see tables below).

SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED INFECTIONS (STIs)

Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) are Category II reportable diseases that require monitoring and investigation by local health departments. There are five reportable STIs in Wisconsin, with chlamydia and gonorrhea being the two most prevalent. Public Health Nurses conduct interviews with confirmed cases of reportable STIs to assess if people have been appropriately treated and assure notification has taken place with their partner(s). Chlamydia is the most commonly reported STI in Wisconsin and the North Shore, and gonorrhea is the second most commonly reported.

In 2021, the rate of gonorrhea in the North Shore was 15.8 per 10,000, compared to 13.1 cases per 10,000 in 2020. The rate of chlamydia in the North Shore in 2021 was 35.3 per 10,000, compared to 32.9 per 10,000 in 2020. For comparison, in Wisconsin in 2020, the rate of gonorrhea was 17.5 per 10,000 and the rate of chlamydia was 44.9 cases per 10,000.

The NSHD maintains an immunization program to prevent and control vaccine-preventable diseases. Under this program, the NSHD provides immunizations to residents without medical insurance and to those whose insurance does not cover immunizations. We offer immunization clinics at both of our offices, and work with families, schools and daycare providers to ensure enrolled children are up-to- date on their immunizations and compliant with the Wisconsin Student Immunization Law.

In 2021, 78 percent of children in the North Shore aged 24 months had all required vaccinations (HepB, DTaP, Hib, PCV13, Polio, MMR and Varicella) and 76 percent of children aged six had all required vaccinations, according to Wisconsin Immunization Registry data.

As part of our effort to prevent influenza, the NSHD provides flu immunizations at our department and to homebound residents. The NSHD provided 577 influenza immunizations in 2021.



THE NURSES AT NSHD PERFORMED 32 TUBERCULIN SKIN TESTS IN 2021.

Although many educational programs have moved away from requiring a Tuberculosis skin test (TST), replaced by the recommended questionnaire that assesses risk, some still require it. Since TSTs require nurse administration and reading, many clinics no longer provide these inexpensive tests, opting to only do the more costly blood tests to assess for TB exposure. NSHD provides this hard to find service for a nominal fee to students and teachers in a variety of programs, including healthcare and education.

ANIMAL BITES AND RABIES CONTROL


The NSHD works with police departments in the North Shore to promptly investigate domestic animal bites for potential rabies exposure. The Health Department is responsible for ensuring that the biting animal is appropriately and legally isolated, observed, and tested for rabies. The NSHD conducted 50 domestic animal bite investigations in 2021. None of these investigations resulted in a rabies case. The NSHD also assisted with testing of wild animals, such as bats, which may have come in contact with humans. The NSHD tested two bats in 2021 and one tested positive for rabies.







STEPPING ON FALL PREVENTION

Held one Stepping On workshop in 2021 consisting of one session per week for seven weeks.

"Stepping On" is a high-level, evidence-based program proven to reduce falls and build confidence in older people. Evidence has shown Stepping On to reduce fall risk among participants by 31%. Stepping On workshops are designed specifically for people who are at risk of falling, have a fear of falling, or who have fallen one or more times.

Workshops are facilitated by trained leaders and provide a safe and positive learning experience. Classes are highly participative and offer mutual support so that participants build confidence in their ability to manage their health behaviors, reduce their risk of falls, and maintain active and fulfilling lives.

We partnered with North Shore Fire & Rescue (NSFR) to hold one Stepping On workshop in 2021. Between NSFR and our department, there are two trained leaders that are able to instruct Stepping On workshops.

BLOOD PRESSURE SCREENINGS

NSHD provides free blood pressure screenings at our Shorewood Office, the Dolan Community Center in Brown Deer, and the Lydell Community Center in Whitefish Bay. Check our website for when these clinics are being offered: www.nshealthdept.org/Clinics.

ELDER REFERRALS

NSHD follows up on referrals we receive regarding health concerns of older adults, including neglect concerns, hoarding, unsafe living conditions, and fall risks. We work in partnership with the Milwaukee County Department on Aging and/or North Shore Fire/Rescue to conduct home visits. These referrals often result in linking older adult residents to other resources in the area to maximize their independence and protect their health and safety.

In 2021, we received and followed up on 11 elder referrals.

OVERDOSE FATALITY REVIEW TEAM

A locally based, multi-disciplinary process for understanding the risk factors and circumstances leading to fatal overdoses and identifying opportunities to prevent future overdoses. The basis of OFR – like all fatality reviews

is that overdose fatalities could have been prevented with the right action, timing, intervention, and/or response.

Wisconsin OFR Overdose Fatality Review

-Medical College of Wisconsin, Wisconsin & Milwaukee County OFR Teams The North Shore Health Department is part of the Milwaukee County OFR team and also conducts additional reviews specific to overdose fatalities that occur in the North Shore.

In 2021, we hosted two virtual OFR meetings and reviewed four overdose fatalities that occurred in the North Shore. Local partners that attended the meetings include local police departments, North Shore Fire & Rescue, Rogers Behavioral Health, Medical College of Wisconsin, and the Milwaukee County Medical Examiner's Office.

The NSHD oversees the North Shore Environmental Health Consortium (NSEHC), which serves as an agent of the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade, and Consumer Protection (DATCP). The NSEHC protects the public's health through enforcement of sanitary regulations and fostering sanitary practices in certain public establishments. The NSEHC provides licensing and inspection services for restaurants, retail food establishments, temporary food vendors, pools and hotels.

In 2021, one Registered Sanitarian completed all the inspections and licensing for the seven North Shore municipalities. This included 35 inspections for new licenses, in addition to the annual inspections that are required for establishments that were already in operation.
