DEMENCIA ALZHEIMERS RESOLUTION

Whereas, the North Shore communities of Shorewood, Whitefish Bay, Fox Point, Bayside, River Hills, Glendale and Brown Deer have provided an historic, visionary role in proposing innovative programs of collaboration to provide their constituencies will more cost effective and valuable services; and,

Whereas, North Shore Health Department Director Becky Rowland welcomes private/public collaborations concerning health issues; and,

Whereas, the health issues involved with Dementia / Alzheimer's involve residents and public officials in all of the North Shore communities; and,

Whereas, new and innovative programs and techniques are being used to benefit and more compassionately support those afflicted with Dementia / Alzheimer's; and,

Whereas, local government health and public safety officials in many instances are the first responders to assist those struggling with this disease; and,

Whereas, additional Dementia / Alzheimer's training and awareness for local government officials will better serve the needs of those afflicted; and,

Whereas, private sector organizations have developed, and are willing to share, new and innovative programs and techniques in this area; and,

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the village (or city) of (name) will collaborate with the private sector and it North Shore neighbors in forming a North Shore Dementia / Alzheimer's Education and Training Program for health and public safety officials; and

Further resolved, that President (name) or Mayor Bryan Kennedy appoint two public or private sector individuals to serve on a temporary Dementia / Alzheimer's Committee to develop a plan in this area and submit its recommendations to their government entities and the general public within 90 days.

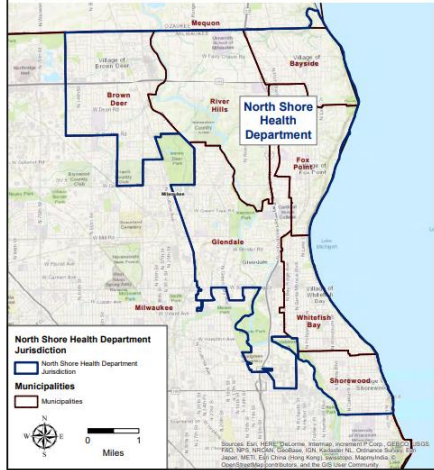
NSHD Funding Formula

- Current formula is set through 2023
- Brown Deer commits to adjust administrative fees for NSHD in 2024, but will remain the fiscal agent for NSHD
- This requires a one-year agreement for 2024, with a proposed fixed-percentage to increase all the 2023 contributions for 2024
- This aligns with a proposed build and move to Glendale in 2024 for NSHD
- The current formula is difficult to explain to officials, staff, and community members
- A model based solely on per capita data (US Census) limits complexities and ensure equity across the 7 municipalities

NSHD Funding Formula

- An adjustment to the formula is necessary because SW and BD will no longer host NSHD
- \$6.60 per resident is proposed
 - Currently, municipalities pay between \$6.23 and \$9.87 per person
- The pandemic has completely shifted utilization in all municipalities
 - Everyone benefits from having access to public health services

Simenz noted that WFB will likely be opposed to increasing their contributions. Rowland to get out ahead and discuss with Manager Boening.

Space Update

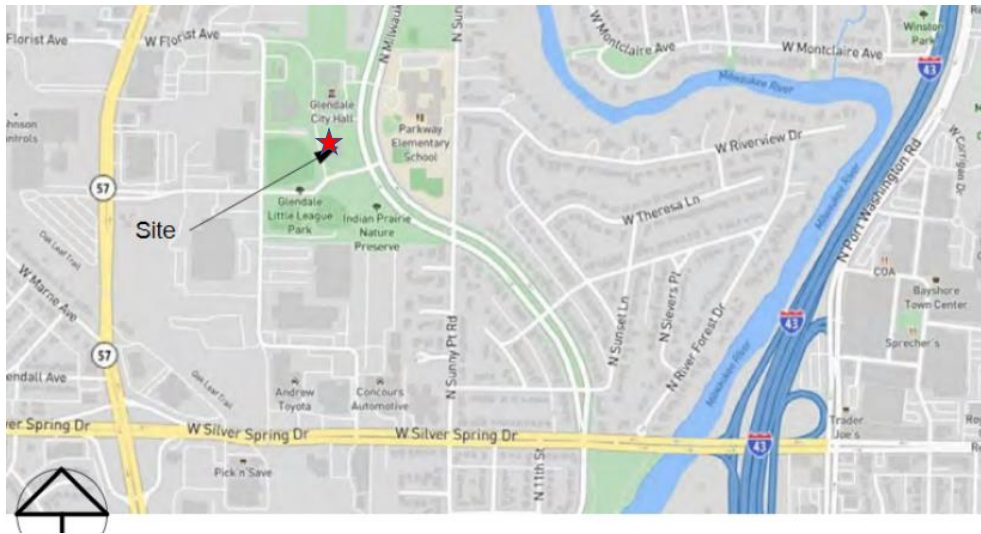
- Presented with Chief Whitaker of NSFR at Brown Deer, Shorewood, and Bayside board meetings to date
- Approved to use ARPA money to support the build
- Currently paying \$31,500 in rent in SW and BD (combined) this will drastically lower our occupancy costs AND we will own our own space in MAX 20 years
- Will also try to purchase an outreach vehicle
 - Thinking Ford Transit or something similar

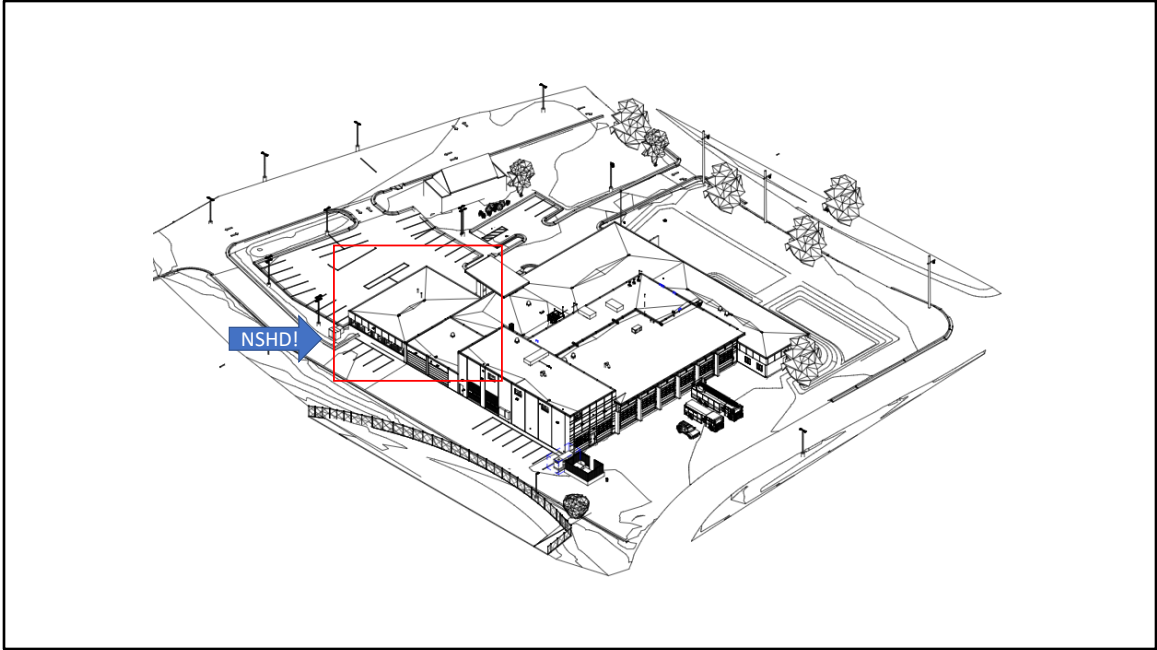


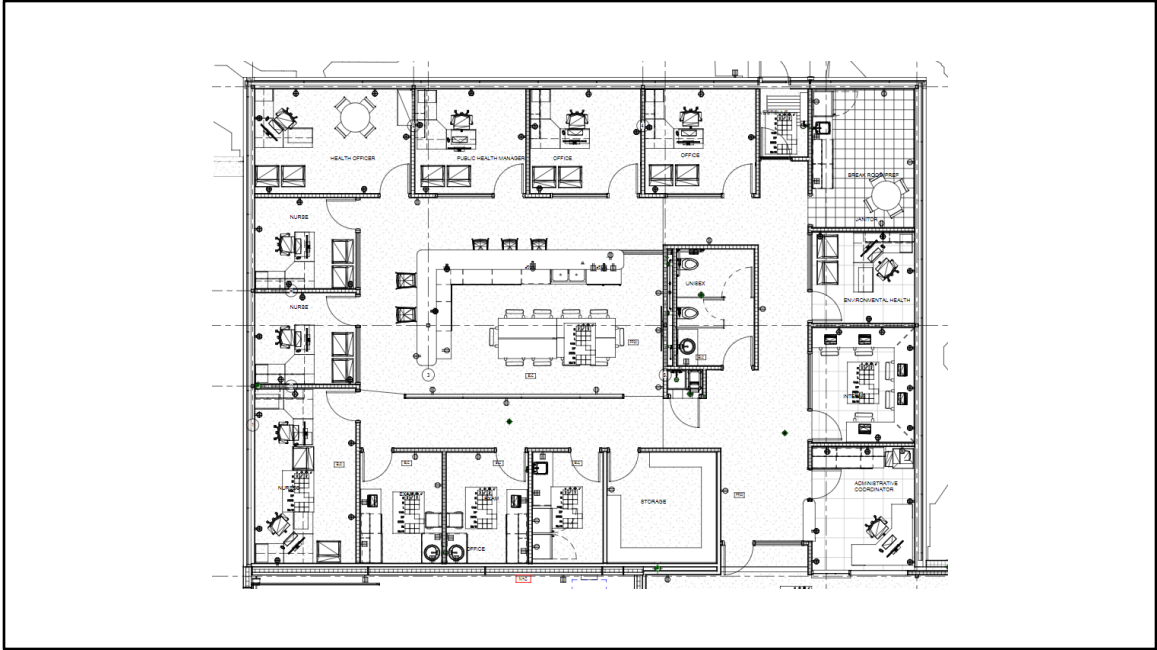
Simenz suggested a routine of regular visits to each municipality and for NSHD to consider purchasing supplies to host pop-up clinics.

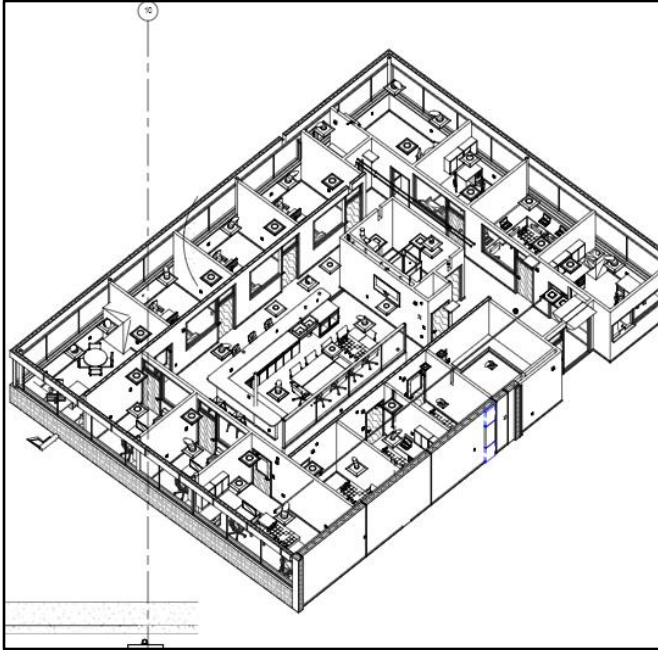
Farrington asked if NSHD would provide transportation to Glendale for individuals to receive vaccine. Rowland to consider it.

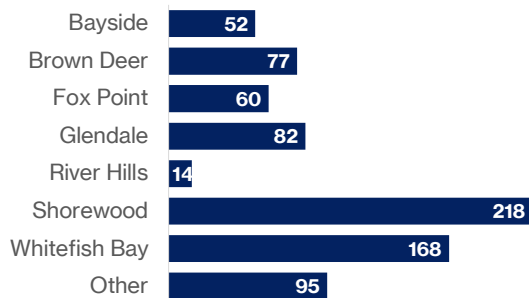

We currently have a PH Nurse and an Environmental Health Specialist position open. Please share with your networks!

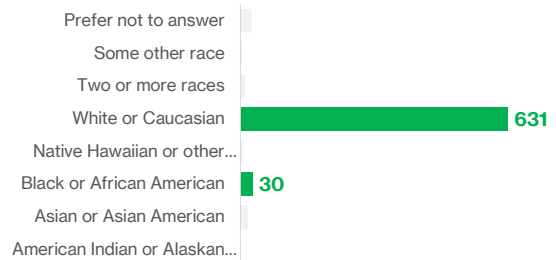
North Shore Community Health Assessment (CHA) updates

Number of survey respondents by community



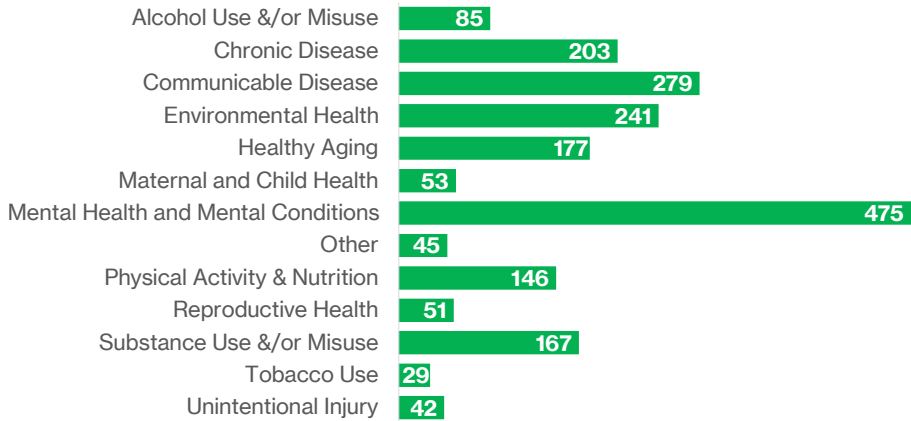
A majority of survey respondents identify as White. A disproportionately small number of respondents identify as Black or African American.

Newer Grants and Projects

- Open Water: \$4K with Safe Kids and the US Coast Guard to educate parents about the potential hazards associated with swimming in open water and how they can minimize the risk to their children by using newly labeled Personal Floatation Devices (PFDs) and water safety
- Qualitative Data: \$35K from WI DHS to build qualitative data capacity across the public health system and better understand the impact of COVID-19 on health inequities in order to develop plans that address those inequities
- Opiates: ~\$35K from WI DHS we are applying for additional funds to conduct Next of Kin interviews after an opiate fatality in our jurisdiction, as well as repeat funds to implement other trainings

Simenz suggested conducting focus groups in the field and partner with community entities in the community. Asked us to think about why people are not engaged in this process. Explain how the CHA is going to help them.

Farrington suggested working to find young families and engage people where they are coming from. She reports it takes people 7 times to see something before things connect.

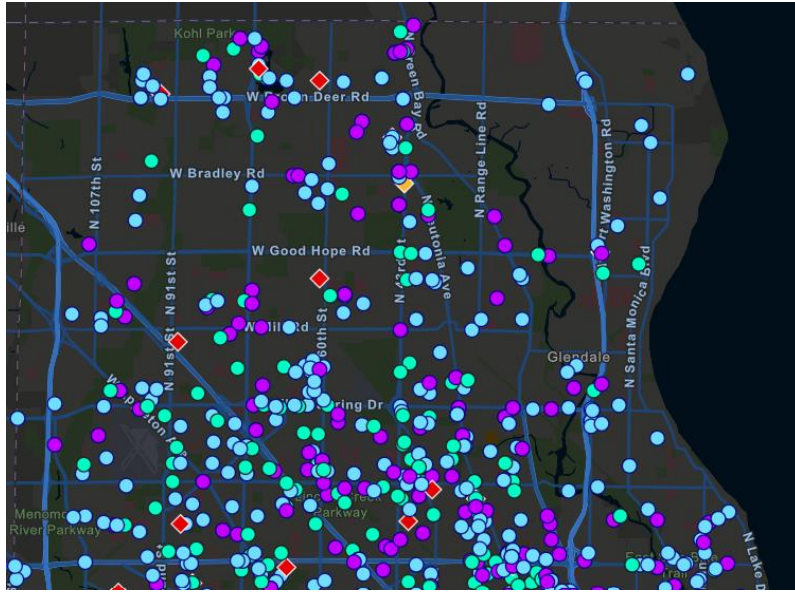



Opiates

- WI DHS released a public health advisory on 8/17/2022 highlighting that fentanyl is increasingly present in overdose deaths in WI
- [DHS data](#) shows that just last year, synthetic opioids, primarily fentanyl, were identified in 91 percent of opioid overdose deaths in Wisconsin, and in 73 percent of all overdose deaths.
- From 2019 to 2021, the number of fentanyl overdose deaths in the state grew by 97 percent.
 - 2019 = 651 deaths
 - 2021 = 1280 deaths
- Cocaine deaths involving synthetic opioids increased 134%.
 - 2019 = 182
 - 2021 = 426
- Fentanyl is being found in all types of drugs, including counterfeit pills, stimulants (cocaine and meth), opioids, and other drugs. It's being pressed into pills and laced into other drugs.

Simenz suggested we look to partner with agencies and provide drug testing (a la spectrometers) and work to build trust.

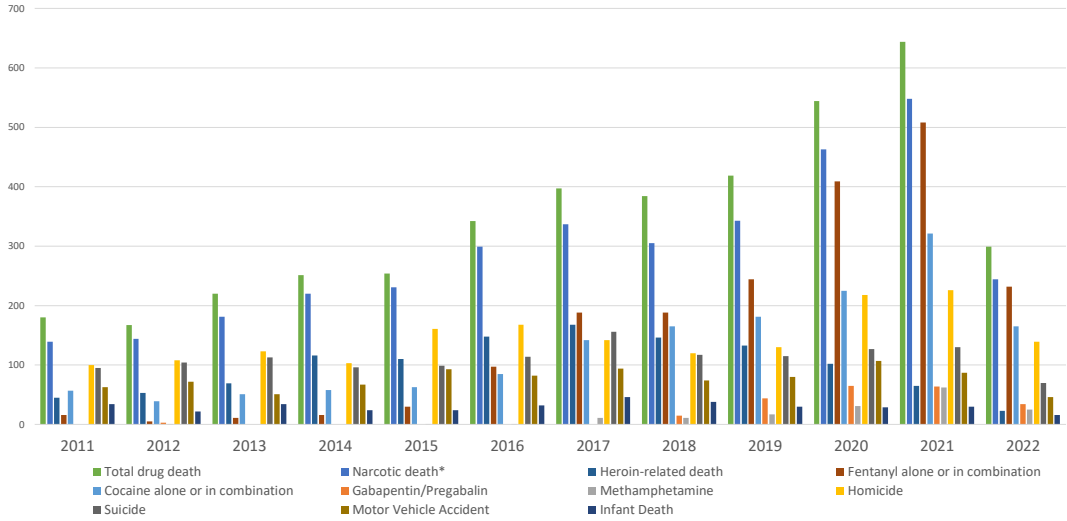

- Recommendation Focus: prevent substance misuse, and introduce harm reduction practices
- Multi-agency
 - North Shore Health Department
 - North Shore Fire and Rescue and Police Departments
 - Medical College of Wisconsin (Institute for Health and Equity, Division of Epidemiology & Social Sciences) and MCW Social Workers
 - Milwaukee County Office of Medical Examiner
 - Law Enforcement: Department of Corrections, Drug Enforcement Agency, Department of Justice and District Attorney
 - Treatment and recovery services, peer recovery specialists, those in recovery, other community members and inter-related organizations.

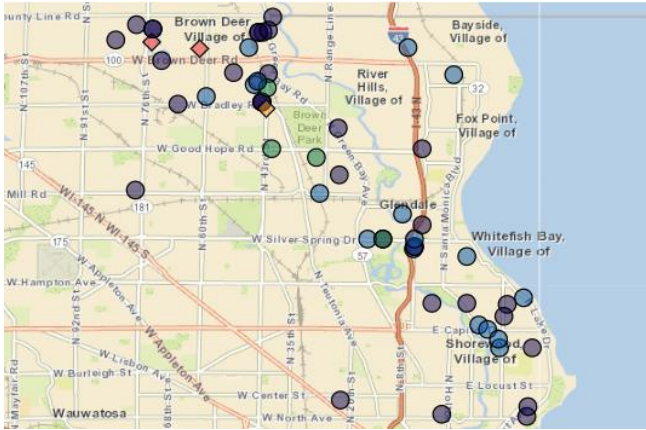
- Founded in 2019,
- Meet quarterly and review 2 fatal overdose cases
- Simenz suggested trauma informed care needs to be addressed in every HS in the NS. Reports stress and mental health are severely impacting children and adolescent.
- Noted that increased prevalence of OD in senior citizens.

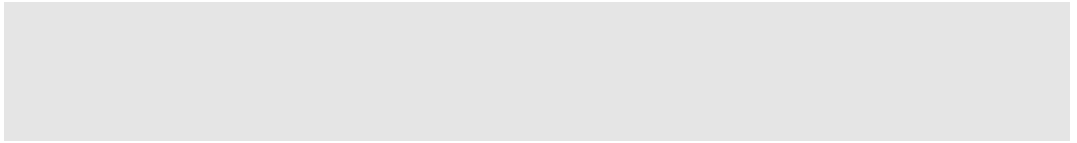



North Shore Tabletop Preparedness Exercise

Some follow up actions for NSHD

- Public information officer training
- Always assign a scribe
- Many systems of communication to gain familiarity with (or streamline)
- Emergency Manager responsibilities are hard to set in stone as they are dependent upon the emergency—think active shooter vs. COVID response
 - Perhaps a 3rd party EM would best serve us
- Develop a training schedule to take a deeper dive into the emergency service functions (ESFs) (essentially chapters) in the CEMP
- All staff should complete ICS 100, 200, 700, 800 FEMA trainings
- Update Job Info Sheets to support just in time learning of emergency response
- NSHD should re-establish relationship with Red Cross—they must be activated and will not just respond to emergencies



MONTHLY REPORT OVERVIEW

JULY 2022

NSHD PRIORITY AREAS

Our department is guided by four priority areas that were identified in the last Community Health Assessment (CHA) and Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) published in 2020.



UPDATES FROM THE HEALTH OFFICER

- ▶ Met with Milwaukee County Health Officers to discuss strategies for ongoing COVID-19 response, Monkeypox, and back to school planning.
- ▶ Met with community members and the president of the WI Policy Forum to plan for the creation of a North Shore Dementia Consortium.
- ▶ Attended full day new Health Officer training in Stevens Point with approximately 35 other new health officers across Wisconsin.
- ▶ Attended Southeast Wisconsin Association of Local Health Departments and Boards (WALHDAB) meeting with SE Region Health Officers.
- ▶ Attended several meetings and informational sessions about Monkeypox response to prepare for contact tracing & disease investigation responsibilities.
- ▶ NSHD received a \$35,000 grant that will support Qualitative Data for Capacity Building and Alignment. NSHD will use these funds for the salary of limited term employees to conduct outreach and community-level work that will intentionally lift the voices of underrepresented communities in our community health assessment and improvement planning.
- ▶ Supported 4 habitability and human health hazard investigations.

#1 MENTAL HEALTH

The new 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline went live on July 15. We shared 4 social media posts about 988 and included it in our weekly highlight emails to community leaders for further distribution.

We are currently interviewing key informants for our Community Health Assessment and the topic of Mental Health is frequently brought up during interviews as a major health concern. This has prompted us to seek out interviews with mental health providers.

Connected with an outreach representative at Roger's Behavioral Health who provided us with outreach materials about the services they provide.

#4 PHYSICAL ACTIVITY & NUTRITION

Social media posts and communications relating to food deserts, farmers markets, and maternal & child health.

Public Health Nurse who is also a Certified Lactation Counselor (CLC) attended Maternal & Child Health grant call and completed home baby visits for breastfeeding consultation.

Shared our summer newsletter with information about community events. Approximately 4,000 people opened the email version of the newsletter, and we had additional readers from social media and our website.

#2 SUBSTANCE USE

Attended the Milwaukee County Overdose Fatality Review meeting

Continued to plan for trauma-informed care training we are hosting in August for our area first responders (North Shore Fire & Rescue & police departments), & other community partners.

Handed out "Signs of an Overdose" and NARCAN info cards at farmers markets

Attended the Wisconsin Overdose Fatality Review (OFR) Community of Practice meeting to learn about the work being done across the State by all of the OFR teams.

Applied for the Narcan Direct Program through WI DHS so we can train people how to use Narcan & distribute Narcan in the community.

2 Social media posts about substance use prevention

Attended an informational session about a grant for Next of Kin interviewing. These interviews are conducted with a decedent's family, friend or loved one following a fatal overdose.

#3 INJURY PREVENTION

11 Car Seat Installations

NSHD received a scope of work (SOW) for a project through WI DHS regarding Lead in Water Testing. We will be supporting childcare entities in testing at their facilities—there are 31 in the NS and the SOW will provide \$1,200 per site tested.

Presented open water swim safety and new life jacket label instruction at community events, as part of US Coast Guard/SafeKids Grant

12 Social media posts related to injury prevention, including life jackets, firework safety, bike safety, fire safety, heat safety, emergency preparedness, and safe camping.

Several bike helmets were fitted and sold at our two offices.

Attended Public Health Emergency Response Plan workgroup meeting.

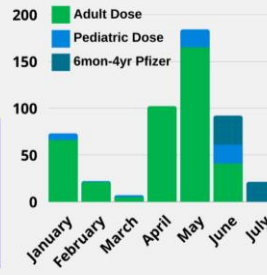
VACCINATIONS

Our department continued to administer COVID-19 vaccines in July for 6 month to 4 year olds. In total, we administered 26 doses of the 6 mon to 4 year Pfizer vaccine. We expect the demand for adult and 5-11 year old boosters will increase again this fall.

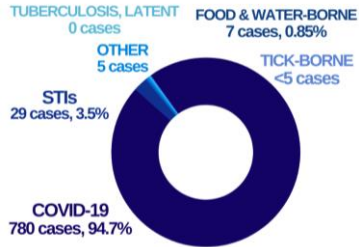
CASE FOLLOW-UP

We adjusted our case follow-up criteria this month so calls are made only for COVID-19 positive cases that are ≤ 12 and ≥ 70 years old. Our primary COVID-19 case manager made 186 calls to COVID-19 positive clients & completed 172 interviews in July. He also received 22 calls from childcare centers and 16 calls from long-term care facilities regarding COVID-19 protocols.

ADDITIONAL COMMUNICABLE DISEASE FOLLOW-UP

- Received notification of 9 animal bites that required complete follow-up and quarantine for rabies prevention & control
- Answered questions and assisted with investigations for the following diseases, among others: Malaria, Legionnaires' disease, Carbapenemase Producing Organism (CPO), Monkeypox
- Started having condoms available for distribution at our offices to promote safe sex & STI prevention

North Shore Environmental Health Consortium

- Completed 51 inspections
- Issued 6 new licenses
- Followed up on 4 complaints
- Attended 6 farmers markets to inspect mobile food vendors

ADDITIONAL JULY HIGHLIGHTS

- Attended community events to promote our community health survey and distribute free health materials: Brown Deer Community Vibes, Shorewood Farmers Market
- Our Senior Environmental Health Specialist, Brad Simerly, was promoted to the Deputy Health Officer position.
- Promoted a community blood drive at our Brown Deer office. A total of 14 people donated.
- Attended workgroup meetings on the State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP) to better align our Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) with the SHIP.



COVID-19 School Guidance

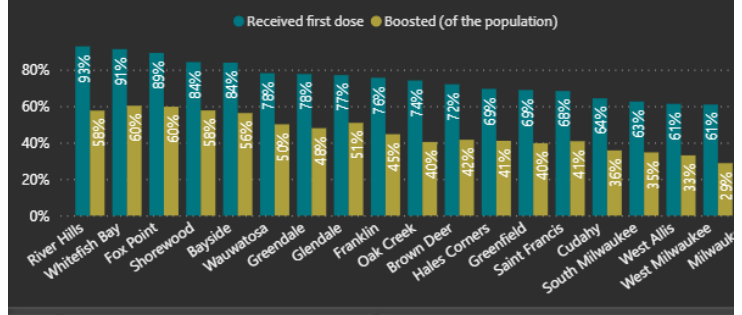
To: Superintendents in Suburban Milwaukee County School Districts

From: Health Officers from Suburban Milwaukee County Health Departments

- Vaccination is the most important prevention strategy for those currently eligible.
- Isolation of positive cases remains important.
- Additional “layers of protection” are still recommended in school settings.
- Quarantining of close contacts remains an important disease control measure. The updated CDC guidance states that all close contacts should wear a high-quality mask for 10 days following exposure and get tested on day 6 (at least 5 full days after exposure).
 - Our recommendation continues to consider quarantining household contacts after a family member tests positive COVID-19. If this is not feasible, then it is recommended that they follow the previous steps outlined, including masking and testing.
 - If any person that has been exposed develops symptoms, they should STAY HOME and get a test.

Milwaukee County COVID to date

Percent of residents who received a vaccination dose by municipality



- Cases decreased last week by 14% (1234 to 1060)
- Cases decreased last week by 21% among kids (251 to 198)
- The proportion of cases among kids is 18.7% compared to 20.3% last week
- Adult hospitalizations are down 5.7% (this data lags due to reporting challenges)
- 2 deaths reported among adults
- Positivity rate for testing this week was 14.2% compared to last week's 15.9%
- Overall vaccination completion of the primary series remains at 60.9% countywide

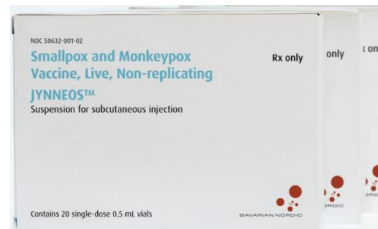

Monkeypox

- As of Tuesday 8/16/2022, there were a reported 45 cases in WI
- NSHD got our first case Tuesday 8/16/2022 in the evening
- Only ~4500 vials of vaccine in WI
- NSHD has 20 vials (100 doses of vaccine); received at the very end of last week
 - Doses increased upon EUA for intradermal administration as opposed to subcutaneous
- We are providing the JYNNEOS vaccine, which is a live, non-replicating vaccine

- This is a 2-dose series with the 2nd dose being given 28 after the initial dose
- Vaccine protection is seen after 2 weeks from 2nd dose
- WI DHS has coached us not to hold any doses back for dose 2 at this time, rather, they will plan to send additional doses as necessary.



Environmental Health Updates



- High-level review of the North Shore Environmental Health Consortium
- In conjunction with Brad's promotion, we have an increased need for a sanitarian in the field to maintain the scope of our contact
- As a result, we have provided 90 days notice to dissolve our contract (0.4 FTE) with Washington/Ozaukee Department of Public Health
 - 90 days expires on 9/7/2022
- Brad completed standardization (with glowing reviews!) in August
- Temporary food season is starting to calm down, so we are starting to catch our breath
- Brad was invited to present at the Wisconsin Environmental Health Association (WEHA) to discuss the partnership between fire and health related events

Simenz asked to speak offline about nutrition and physical activity with Rowland Lewis motioned to adjourn the meeting took place at 730pm. Roberts seconded. Next meeting is 11/17/2022

Monkeypox

Current Eligibility:

- PEP: for individuals over 18 who have close contact with a confirmed case. CDC recommends that vaccines are given within 4 days of exposure to provide the best chance of preventing disease
- PEP++: for people identified with having certain risk factors for exposure to MPS. Offers PEP to individuals considered more likely to be exposed to MPX
- We will work diligently to not waste any doses
- Vaccine is available in Brown Deer and Shorewood



- Plan to keep a list of PEP++ so we can urgently respond with PEP to those with a known exposure and get 5 individuals vaccinated (one whole vial)
- Minimally, we plan to clear the list weekly
- Based upon number of infections, suspect cases, and calls we are not planning to have any mass vaccine clinics
