March 1, 2023: Colon Cancer Screening

March is National Colon (Colorectal) Cancer Awareness Month. Talk to a healthcare provider today about scheduling a colon cancer screening.

It is recommended adults aged 45 to 75 be screened for colon (colorectal) cancer. Those over 75, or younger than 45, and/or at increased risk of colon cancer should discuss screening needs with a healthcare provider. Almost all colon cancers start as precancerous polyps (abnormal growths) and can be present for years with no early signs or symptoms.

Colon cancer screenings can find and remove precancerous polyps before they progress into cancer.

What are colon cancer risk factors?

An individual's risk increases as they age. There are also health and lifestyle factors that can influence risk.

Health factors:

- 1. Infammatory bowel disease (Crohn's disease or ulcerative colitis).
- A personal or family history of colorectal cancer or colorectal polyps.
- 3. A genetic syndrome such as familial adenomatous polyposis (FAP)external icon or hereditary non-polyposis colorectal cancer (Lynch syndrome).

Lifestyle factors:

- Diet choices such as a diet low in fruit and vegetables and/or low-fiber and high-fat diet, or a diet high in processed meats.
- 2. Lack of regular physical activity.
- 3. Overweight and obesity.
- 4. Consumption of alcohol and/or tobacco use.

FENTANYL AWARENESS

ONE PILL CAN KILL

"Fentanyl is the single deadliest drug threat our nation has ever encountered. Fentanyl is everywhere. From large metropolitan areas to rural America, no community is safe from this poison." – Anne Milgram, DEA Administrator

- Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is 100 times more potent than morphine and 50 times more potent than heroin.¹
- Substance-related deaths due to fentanyl have been on the rise across the United States, with both Wisconsin and Milwaukee County following this trend.
- In Wisconsin, fentanyl overdose deaths grew by 97 percent from 2019 (651) to 2021 (1,280).² Approximately 80% of the drug-related deaths that occurred in Milwaukee County in 2021 involved some form of fentanyl, with preliminary data showing the same for 2022.³

Illegally produced fentanyl is being found mixed into other substances and pressed into fake pills that mimic pharmaceutical drugs, like oxycodone. You cannot see, taste or smell fentanyl, and as little as two grains of salt is enough to kill someone. This epidemic is far-reaching. Young people who experiment with pills or other substances likely don't know the risk associated with taking even just one pill. The counterfeit pills may appear

harmless, but accidental deaths from fentanyl – or fentanyl poisonings – are on the rise.

What can you do? Parents, guardians, and families

- Talk to your kids and loved ones about the risk of substance use.
- Look out for changes in kids' attitudes and behaviors that could indicate they are struggling with their mental health and may be considering turning to substances.
- Keep NARCAN® on hand and learn how to use it. The North Shore Health Department has NARCAN® that is free for the public. We provide brief training on how to spot the signs of an overdose and how to administer NARCAN® along with the doses we give out.
