
April 19, 2023: Prescription Drug Take Back


Drug Take Back Day. Drug Take Back Day is being held on April 22 this year. National Drug Take Back days are usually held twice a year by the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, once in April and another in October. These days are important to prevent prescription drugs from getting in the wrong hands and potentially leading to tragic ends. Drug overdose is still a pressing issue for the public's health and safety. To address that, Drug Take Back Day encourages the nation to remove unneeded medications from homes to prevent medication misuse and opioid addiction.

The Current Opioid Epidemic The opioid crisis was declared a public health emergency by the Department of Health and Human Services in 2017, yet it has been an issue since the 1990s. Now, opioids are involved in 75% of drug overdose deaths. Between 1999 and 2020, more than 564,000 people have died from opioid overdoes, including prescription and illicit opioids.

The rise of opioids has gone through three different waves since the 1990s. During the first wave in the 1990s, prescription overdose deaths contributed to most opioid deaths. Prescription opioids include natural, semi-synthetic, and methadone, which are all prescribed by doctors. 2010 marked the beginning of the second phase with a rise in heroin overdose deaths. The third wave, and current wave, was marked in 2013 with a rise in synthetic opioid overdose deaths. Synthetic opioids include illicitly made fentanyl and tramadol.

How to Participate in Drug Take Back Day

Collection is fast and anonymous. Simply find a collection site near you and drop your items into a bin. You can bring prescription and over-the-counter medications to drop off, including:

- Capsules
- Creams
- Inhalers
- Non-aerosol sprays
- Ointments
- Patches
- Pills
- Vials

Liquids must be dropped off in their original containers, pet medications are accepted, and e-cigarette devices must have the batteries removed because they are highly flammable.

The following ARE NOT accepted:

- Aerosol cans
- Anything containing blood or a bodily fluid.
- Household hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, oil, gas)
- Illegal drugs
- Iodine containing medications.
- Mercury thermometers
- Personal care products (shampoo, soaps, lotions, sunscreens, etc.)

- Sharps/syringes
- Vape pens/e-cigarette devices with a built-in battery that cannot be removed.

- 4,340 total law enforcement participation
- 4,902 total collection sites across the country
- Total weight collected: 647,163 lbs.
- Total weight of all time (from 23 Take Back Days): 16,636,729 lbs.
