MONTHLY REPORT — MAY & JUNE 2023

NSHD Priority Areas

The goal of these monthly reports is to showcase the work being done at the North Shore Health Department and to increase transparency with community leaders, partners, elected officials, and the public.



We align our work with our department's four priority areas that were established in the last Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) published in 2020. The monthly report highlights the work done in each of our four priority areas over the past month, as well as other important work and activities done by our department. We completed our 2022-26 Community Health Assessment (CHA) which will lead into the development of a new CHIP with updated priority areas.

May & June Highlights

- Completed the North Shore <u>Community Health Assessment</u> (CHA) and presented it to our Board of Health in May. The CHA has data from our community survey and key informant interviews conducted in summer and fall of 2022, as well as other data that summarizes the health status of our North Shore communities.
- We were featured on Fox6 Milwaukee WakeUp and Real MKE to promote our booth at the Brown Deer Farmers market and raise awareness about ticks. You can <u>watch our segment here</u>. We will be at the Brown Deer Farmers Market again on July 19 and the Whitefish Bay Farmers Market on August 12.
- NSHD gained access to ESSENCE which is a syndromic surveillance data system that allows public health officials to track emergency department visits to identify trends or potential health threats.

Updates from the Health Officer

Completed our 140 review with the WI Department of Health Services (DHS). These reviews are done every 5 years to ensure local health departments in Wisconsin are meeting Wisconsin state statutes and administrative codes that outline the required services of health departments.

Submitted end-of-year report for our Communicable Disease grant through Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS).

Submitted budget proposals for the next year of Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) and City Readiness Initiative (CRI) funding. This funding is funneled from CDC to the WI DHS and then to local health departments.

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MENTAL HEALTH

Worked on Maternal Child Health (MCH) program planning, specifically addressing social connectedness and mental health associated with new parents and caregivers. Met with parents and caregivers at libraries during story time to survey them as we plan our parent social group.

Overdose Fatality Review (OFR) and substance use meetings and/or trainings were attended by our Public Health Strategist who leads our OFR.

Our Health Officer attended the WI Opioid Stimulant and Trauma Summit in May, the inaugural WI Harm Reduction Conference in June, and a Place of Last Drink training.

Participated in the Richards and Cumberland Elementary School Bike Rodeos with Whitefish Bay Police Department




Healthy Highlights Recap
