DHS New COVID-19 Guidance on Quarantine:

In response to new guidelines released by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Department of Health Services (DHS) has [updated quarantine guidance](#) for close contacts of someone diagnosed with COVID-19.

The recommended quarantine length remains 14 days because the incubation period for COVID-19 is still 14 days. The new guidance provides two options for shortening quarantine for those that are asymptomatic.

New Quarantine Options for Close Contacts without Symptoms

10-Day Quarantine



7-Day Quarantine

For the 7-day test out option, the earliest you are able to get tested is 48 hours before the end of quarantine. The quarantine period goes through the **end of the day** on Day 7, so testing should be done no earlier than Day 6.

Whether you complete the 7-day or 10-day quarantine, it is still recommended you self-monitor for symptoms through Day 14. To self-monitor you should check your temperature twice a day and be aware of signs of fever like chills or sweats, and also be alert for cough, difficulty breathing or other [symptoms of COVID-19](#).

The antigen positives may be confirmed with a PCR test – if the PCR test is positive, they are added to the confirmed cases. If the PCR test is negative, they are no longer considered antigen positive.
