Considering weekend plans? Remember that some activities are much higher risk than others for transmission of COVID-19. Over the past few weeks, we have observed cases of COVID-19 steadily increase in the North Shore (see graph below). Community transmission is occurring and gathering in crowded spaces is contributing to this rise in cases. It is important to avoid close contact with non-household members when you are inside and outside, and if you are considering going out this weekend remember to:

- Stay at least 6 feet away people you don't live with. Make sure that the place you are going has adequate room to space out. Also, outside is still better than inside!
- Wear a cloth face covering. Face masks should be worn in indoor public places at all times and outdoor public places when you are not able to physically distance from others. If you are at the beach and you can't always maintain your distance, put on a mask!
- Don't share items with people you don't live with.
- Wash your hands often and have hand sanitizer along to use as needed.
- Stay home if you are sick.

This graph shows the number of new cases of COVID-19 by day in the North Shore, along with the 7-day average of the number of new cases per day. We have observed a rapid increase in the number of new cases per day since early July.
