EXPOSED TO SOMEONE WITH COVID-19?

Close contacts are directed to quarantine for 14 days from the last date of exposure.

If you are tested during the 14-day quarantine period and you test negative, this does not mean your quarantine is over. It can take up to 14 days for you to get sick with COVID-19.

A negative test on any day during your quarantine period does not give you clearance to return to work or participate in social activities or events. If your employer requires a negative test result before returning to work, wait until your quarantine period is over.

QUARANTINE



If you were in close contact with someone that has COVID-19, the quarantine period is 14 days from the date of last exposure. A negative test during your 14-day quarantine period does not mean you should go back to work or see others. Quarantine guidance from the CDC: [Click Here](#)

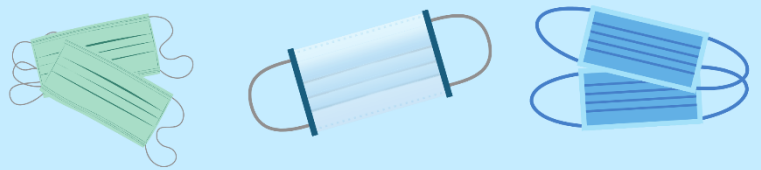
